Mr. George Walton Craddock

Our first World War I soldier for this newsletter is Mr. George Walton Craddock.

He was born October 16, 1894. He was the son of Alberry B. and Annie Mariah (Walton) Craddock. In the 1910 census, he had four sisters and one brother. In the home was Mrs. Drusilla Craddock. She may have been the grandmother. In 1920, he was living at Hiseville with Eliza F. Edwards. He married Mary Willie Edwards. They went to Indiana to get married. They got their marriage licenses on November 28, 1917. Mr. Ernest Jacob married them. They had one son, Bailey Anderson, who was born on July 15, 1920 and died in 1986. He is also buried in the Pearl Webb Cemetery.

He registered for WWI on June 5, 1917. Mr. W.H. Broady signed his papers. He entered the service on October 2, 1917 at Camp Taylor. He was a Union soldier. He came out of the war as a corporal. He died on October 15, 1921 at the young age of 27. He died of a brain tumor, while

living in Cave City. Dr. Depp of Hiseville signed his death certificate. Mr. James Winn buried him. Others from this area that entered the service at the same time were Homer Wells, Leslie King, Bill Druen, Mansfield Burks, Reid Bolton, Smith White, Thomas Hines, and Munford Moss.

Mr. Edward Voyage Ennis

Mr. Edward Voyage Ennis will be the other WWI soldier for this newsletter.

He was born on August 8, 1894 at Defries, KY to John Edward and Iva Myrtle (Obanion) Ennis. He married Mary Susan Hodge on March 11, 1901. They were married in Clark County, Indiana on February 1, 1920 by Ernest E. Jacobs. She was the daughter of William and Maggie (Houk) Hodge.

The 1930 census listed him as a farmer with three children – Marjorie M., born 1921, Erusie E. (Jack), born 1922, and Bretia M., born 1925. He registered for WWI on June 5, 1914. He was working for Producers Creamery in Oleans, Indiana.

He reported to Camp Taylor on September 18, 1917. He left New York aboard ship 501 as a private in the 336th Inf. He returned from St. Nazaire, Grand aboard Edgar F. Lukenbach on April 29, 1919, listed as a wagoner with Supply Co., 100th Inf., arriving in Philadelphia, Pa on May 17, 1919. He returned to his hometown of Canmer. He also registered for WWII with C.E. Nichols signing his papers.

His wife, Mary, died May 12, 1950 at her home. Mr. Ennis died on August 29, 1960. His doctor was Dr. Harold Spevack and Sego Funeral Home buried him in the Pearl Webb Cemetery.
